The Tunnel of Chaos

A little over ten years ago, a read a book of leadership maxims. One of the adages in this book was titled "The Tunnel of Chaos" and the chapter on this saying opened with this:

One of the greatest contributions author and psychiatrist M. Scott Peck made to this world was to shine a spotlight on the differences between participating in genuine community and experiencing what he coined "pseudo community."

If community involves things such as knowing and being known, serving and being served, loving and being loved, and celebrating and being celebrated, then most relationships, Peck asserted, are constantly devolving into pseudo community. It's the great temptation for small groups of people to slide into a state where they're not quite telling each other the truth and they're not quite celebrating each other. Instead, they tolerate each other, they accommodate for each other, and they settle for sitting on the unspoken matters that separate them.

...What captured my imagination about Peck's concept was the aha that in order to move from pseudo community to genuine community, you have to endure a little chaos. To break free from falsehood, someone has to upset the applecart and say out loud, "As far as I can tell, we're not experiencing real community here."

(Bill Hybels, Axiom, 2008).

Hybels went on to note that we all want to get to true community, but we find ourselves in pseudo community. To move from one place to the other, "you have to be willing to go down into a tunnel...a tunnel called chaos."

In the last few weeks, we have seen the breakdown of pseudo community. Especially at the forefront has been race relations across our county. For many, true community among residents of the same neighborhoods and cities is more of a dream than a reality. But it hasn't just been the racial divide that has highlighted pseudo community. Our political persuasions have been more divisive than strengthening. Our diversity of thought on the management of COVID-19 has unintentionally put medicine and public policy in a wrestling

match. And our strong desire for a return to face-toface interaction has highlighted that we have substituted a number of things (some good, some not) for community. Chaos is a good word to describe many of our interpersonal relationships these days. Hybels suggested that we often settle for pseudo community instead of demanding the real deal because of fear. "What if airing the issue actually makes things worse?" "What if probing the situation only serves to ruin the relationship?" we think. The only solution is to enter the tunnel. It can be messy. It can be scary. It can be ambiguous. But it is almost always worth it. It's how we one day pop-up into the fresh, life-giving daylight of true community.

Given the situations we find ourselves in today personally, regionally, nationally - how do we move towards true community? Jesus said, "If you are offering your gift at the altar and you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift." (Matthew 5:23-24) Said a little more plainly, you can make things right with God until you make things right with the people around you. You can't have peace with God if you can't have peace with the people in your family; with your neighbor. I think we believe this to be true. But, sometimes, we are afraid fearful - to live this out.

In 1 Peter 3:13-16, Peter writes:

Who is going to harm you if you are eager to do good? But even if you should suffer for what is right, you are blessed. "Do not fear their threats; do not be frightened." But in your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope you have. But do this with gentleness and respect, keeping a clear conscience.

While this biblical passage is often used to describe the need to be ready to talk about our beliefs, Jay Pathak and Dave Runyon point out that there is also another instruction: "When you encounter other

people, do not fear. Do not be frightened. Even when everyone around you chooses fear, you have a hope that is greater. Live out that hope, and don't be afraid to talk about it." And if Jesus Christ is our Lord, then we clearly know what Christ has commanded: Love your neighbor as yourself.

Entering the tunnel of chaos is frightening. It may push us to think differently, act differently, believe differently. It may challenge some lifelong assumptions. It may cause us to see our family and our neighbors in a new light. But whether its politics, race, socioeconomic status, gender, age, practical concerns, or one of a thousand other things that makes us different from another, our commitment to entering the tunnel of chaos can work to bridge that divide. So be open to where the Spirit is

prompting you to enter the tunnel. It's one of the truest tests of character and love.


